## PAWS: share the story



## of domestic violence survivors and their pets

Each year, nearly 1 million animals are abused or killed in connection with domestic violence.

**Abusers of** animals are 5 times more likely to harm humans.

The Pet and Women Safety Act, or PAWS Act (H.R. 909/S. 322) was reintroduced in February 2017 by U.S. Senators Gary Peters (D-MI) and Dean Heller (R-NV). This bicameral, bipartisan legislation aims to protect victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking and dating violence from emotional and psychological trauma caused by violence against their pets.

## Why is the PAWS Act Needed?

A significant unmet need exists across the United States for women seeking safety for themselves and their children from violent relationships. While a strong network of shelters exists to provide them a safe place, there is a need for more domestic violence shelters to provide accommodations that include pets.

Abusers use pets as pawns, and survivors tend to remain in abusive relationships out of concern for the welfare and safety of their pets. With too few domestic violence shelters equipped to house and care for pets, survivors often must choose between a life without their pet or a dangerous living situation.

## How you can help

ROSE PROOKS Located in Kansas City, Missouri, Rose Brooks Center became the first domestic violence shelter in the region to welcome pets through the creation of Paws Place, a pet shelter co-located on the Rose Brooks facility and funded by Bayer Animal Health.



Noah's Animal House is a full service boarding facility on the grounds of the largest women and children's shelter in Nevada, The Shade Tree Shelter. After eight years in operation, Noah's Animal House has cared for and protected over 1,000 pets for the women and children at the shelter.



Located in New York City, The Urban Resource Institute People and Animals Living Safely (URIPALS) program was launched on-site at URI's Urban Women's Safe Haven and Urban Women's Retreat shelters. URIPALS is the first co-sheltering program in New York City.

Almost half of abused women say they are unable to escape abusive living situations because they worry about what will happen to their pets should they leave.1
